

I was touched and impressed by the enthusiasm, dedication and professionalism of the people involved in the organisation of the congress and I am sure that you will have the same experience during your stay in Lyon.

Libraries, Citizens, Societies: Confluence for Knowledge

The theme for IFLA WLIC 2014 « Libraries, Citizens, Societies: Confluence for Knowledge » is a profound manifestation of the two core concepts of Sinikka Sipila's presidential theme: "Strong Libraries and Strong Societies". The WLIC theme highlights the inclusive nature of the library as a democratic institution that provide spaces for information-sharing and learning for all ages, genders, ethnicities and socio-economic groups regardless of their needs as well as a critical provider of information, data and knowledge. As a major community resource, libraries today are empowering people to participate in a civil society.

This theme is to target every citizen, librarian and all other relevant libraries stakeholder, inside and outside the library, to promote the crucial role of libraries.

This year's Congress logo expresses in a simple but eloquent manner the personality of Lyon.



The symbolic background of the logo is the peninsula formed by alluvial deposits laid down at the confluence of two rivers: the Rhône, a strongly flowing river that comes from the Alps and the Saône, by contrast, a gentler and more easily navigable river, linking Lyon with the plains of northeastern France. The swirls of the letter "Y" have been utilized to make an image of the peninsula. According to Unesco, the confluence of these rivers "has historically shaped an exceptional testimony to the continuity of urban settlement over more than two millennia" and united people and cultural traditions from many parts of Europe.

The bright blue color relates to light and light is necessary to create an image exposure on a frame of film or on a digital target: it refers to the famous light festival "Fête des Lumières", earning Lyon the title of Capital of Lights as well as its significant role in the history of cinema due to Auguste and Louis Lumière, who invented the cinématographe in Lyon.

This logo fully reflects what IFLA WLIC 2014 is going to be: a meeting place for librarians from all over the world.

Climate

Lyon is classed as borderline oceanic and humid subtropical (Koppen Cfb/Cfa). Winters are colder than much of the south of France due to its more inland position, averaging 3.2 °C (37.8 °F) in January. Summers are very warm, averaging just above 22 C /71.6 F) in August. Precipitation is an average of 62 millimetres in August.

A cloakroom will be open opposite the registration during registration opening times.

Culture and Entertainment

The Lyon metropolitan area lies in a strategic location in the natural plain of the Rhone Valley. It is surrounded by the Beaujolais country in the north, the Monts du Lyonnais in the west, and the plains of the Dombes and Isère in the east and north.

Halfway between the sea and the mountains, the city is characterized by duality. The two hills overlooking the city: Fourvière and Croix-Rousse and the two very different rivers running through Lyon reveal the two faces of the town. Another remarkable feature is the location at the confluence of the two rivers, the Rhône and Saône.

Whether you are high on top of Fourvière hill, meandering in, Vieux-Lyon', the city's most historic district, or climbing the slopes of the Croix-Rousse, you are in an area of nearly 500 hectares where Lyon has played out its history over the last 2,000 years. This site has been on UNESCO's World Heritage List since 1998. According to the UNESCO World Heritage Committee, Lyon bears exceptional testimony to the continuity of urban settlement over more than two millennia. In Lyon, the topography allowed neighbourhoods gradually to extend eastwards over the course of the centuries, leaving a remarkable physical continuity in the locations favoured by each historical period. Lyon is a city of light: those out for a stroll in the early evening will notice the illuminations that

show up the contours of the rivers and create haloes around the monumental facades of the Hôtel Dieu, the Lyon Stock Exchange, the Fine Arts Museum and the City Hall. Lighting is an essential element in Lyon's urban design. The city's geographical situation is well suited to illuminations, with its two hills that offer so many points of view and its two rivers, the Rhône and the Saône, that never stop shimmering.

Passports, Visas and Letters of Invitation

All foreign nationals entering and staying on French territory must be in possession of a valid entry and stay visa, unless being exempt from this requirement. Your passport must be valid for at least three months beyond the date of expiry of your short-stay visa. It must contain at least two blank pages to take the visa and French entry and exit stamps. However, it is the sole responsibility of the attendee to take care of his/her visa requirements and it is best to consult your local consular office for the latest information with regards to entering France. Attendees who require an entry visa must allow sufficient time for the application procedure. Attendees should contact the nearest embassy or consulate to determine the appropriate timing of their visa applications. It is recommended to apply for a visa at least three months in advance of the Congress.

Smoking

Smoking is prohibited in all public places in France except for allocated smoking areas that are clearly marked. Since May 2013 the ban in public places has extended to electronic cigarettes.

Tax Refund Schemes

Tax-Free Purchases

If you reside outside the European Union and are 15 years or older, you have the right to a VAT (or GST) refund on selected items if the amount of your purchases is greater than or equal to EUR 175 and that they are made on the same day, in the same store.

You must then specify to the vendor that you wish to buy tax-free and then they will give you the appropriate export receipt. This receipt must then be signed by the customs office before checking-in at your point of departure.

If the vendor is affiliated with Travelex, you may then go to their outlet to receive your refund, if

not, then send the signed receipt to the vendor who will then refund by bank transfer or check. Since the 1st of June, 2011, a simplified electronic receipt system has been in place to avoid waiting in long queues at the counters for tax refunds.

Since November 2008, a clearance programme of tax-free sales receipts by optical scanning of bar codes PABLO has been set up at the airports of Roissy-Charles de Gaulle, Orly, Lyon St Exupéry, Marignane, Nice, Geneva and the port terminal in Marseille and the Swiss border. in Saint-Julien-en-Genevois.

At these sites, the traditional customs stamp has been replaced with terminals equipped with multilingual touch screens and an optical barcode reader able to process export documents issued by retailers affiliated with the two main duty free operators, Premier Tax Free and Global Blue.

Taxis

Using taxis in Lyon is easy. Just call one of the many taxi hotlines or wait at one of the numerous taxi stations dotted around the city. You can hail a taxi as long as it is at least 50 m (160 ft) from a taxi station.





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

Keynote Speaker: Bernard Stiegler Theme: The Future of Reading

Twenty one years ago, with the appearing of the world wide web, the world became a vast duplication of the world – a planetary multimedia and "crossmedia" library, more or less fueled, willingly or not, by all those accessing the networks, and accessible everywhere in the world, if not available for everyone.

The stupefying dynamism of "linguistic capitalism", which rapidly took over the digitization of all sorts of collections, and in particular book collections, may have then given the impression that the glorious era of libraries was over. However, the time of libraries might start again – and as a new age of reading and writing, for example through what in Tokyo, Hidetaka Ishida, vice president of Todaï university library, has been calling hybrid reading.

Hybrid reading is based upon the accumulation and sharing of their reading notes by the readers of a library collection. By collecting and editing those notes on the base of a graphic annotation language, the library becomes a place for collective interpretative activities through which hermeneutics communities can form, and which constitute what we, at the Institute for Research and Innovation, call a process of transindividuation (thus referring to the concept of transindividual forged by Gilbert Simondon).

In the process of the digital duplication of the world, the activity of shared, concerted and editorialized annotation constitutes the future of know-

ledge, which is still itself based on the interpretation of corpora born of the accumulation of knowledge. This is why the World Wide Web Consortium organized an international workshop on annotation in San Francisco in the month of April 2014. It is also the reason why the first Bibliothèque de France project – which in 1989 was called the "Très Grande Bibliothèque" – rested upon a computer-assisted reading station allowing the constitution, the sharing and the exchange of reading notes.

The web of tomorrow will be based on qualified contributions which will allow confrontation between hermeneutics communities, themselves allowing the tracing and the publishing of interpretative differences, but also that of the controversies and arguments which shall emerge from these differences. The structures of teaching will follow the same path. And a new editorial industry shall result from this.

Libraries allow the formation of what Gaston Bachelard called "bibliomènes", textual occurrences of what Jack Goody called intellectual technologies, and in the milieu of which "bibliothèses" can emerge: that is to say intellectual positions and dispositions resting upon written traces.

Nowadays however, along with the digital, the main contribution of digitizationis reading traces, as they more and more massively constitute the material for the digital "bibliothèses" which are the future of libraries – as far as they are able to favor their editorialization by becoming the reference sites and the starting points of digital transindividuation circuits through which will form the knowledge of the 21st century.

Bernard Stiegler is one of the leading French philosophers of our generation. He develops the work of Jacques Derrida, Gilbert Simondon and Andre Leroi-Gourhan in a wide-ranging analysis of our relationship with technology. Bernard Stiegler established himself in France in 1994 with the publication of the first volume of La Technique et Le Temps ('Technics and Time').

Throughout his life, Bernard Stiegler has published widely on the subjects of philosophy, technology, digitisation, and on the problem of individuation in consumer capitalism. Some of his most notable works include: two volumes of De La Misère Symbolique ('Of Symbolic Misery'), three volumes of Mécréance et Discrédit ('Disbelief and Discredit') and two volumes Constituer l'Europe ('Constituting Europe'). His 2009 publication Acting out is particularly well known.

Bernard Stiegler has a long term engagement with the relation between technology and philosophy, not only in a theoretical sense, but also situating them in industry and society as practices. He is one of the founders (in 2005) of the political group Ars Industrialis based in Paris, which calls for an industrial politics of spirit, by exploring the possibilities of the technology of spirit, to bring forth a new "life of the mind". Since 2013, Bernard Stiegler has also been a member of the Conseil national du numérique (CNNum—French Digital Council).

Bemard Stiegler is Director of the Institut de Recherche et d'Innovation (IRI), professor of philosophy at Université de Technologie de Compiègne and Professorial Fellow at Goldsmiths, University of London, and until 2009 was director of the Department of Cultural Development at the Pompidou Centre in Paris.

Plenary Speaker: Her Royal Highness Princess Laurentien of the Netherlands

Founder and Honorary Chair of Stichting Lezen & Schrijven (Reading & Writing Foundation)

Princess Laurentien works to promote issues focusing on the development of individuals and their impact on society. In particular, she is active in the fields of literacy and sustainability.

Keynote and Plenary Speakers

Literacy

In 2004 she founded Stichting Lezen & Schrijven (Reading & Writing Foundation), which works both in the Netherlands and internationally to prevent illiteracy among children and to reduce it among adults. The foundation raises awareness of the issue, supports initiatives in this field, and actively combats illiteracy through the Language for Life programme. As part of her international work, the Princess is Special Envoy for UNESCO on Literacy and Development, and in 2011 European Commissioner for Education Androulla Vassiliou appointed her as Chair of the EU High Level Group of experts on Literacy, which presented its findings in 2012. As of 1 January 2014, the Reading & Writing Foundation is also be active at the EU level, promoting literacy through ELINET and the Public Libraries 2020 programme.

Furthermore, Princess Laurentien is President of the European Cultural Foundation and Honorary President of a number of other organisations in the field of language, such as the Dutch Association of Public Libraries.

Sustainability

Princess Laurentien has been active in the field of sustainability and wild-life preservation for more than a decade. She is President of Fauna & Flora International, Fellow at the European Climate Foundation, Advisor for the Harbour of Rotterdam's 'Harbor Vision 2030', Special Advisor of Rewilding Europe, and Founder and Director of the Missing Chapter Foundation (MCF). This organisation has been active since 2010 and originates from the notion that decisions are more durable and gain value if they take into account the sharp insights, logical questions and surprising solutions from children and teenagers. For this reason, it is MCF's mission to bring together children and decision-makers to engage in dialogue and discuss themes related to sustainability, among others. MCF has three lines of programmes: the Kids' Council (de Raad van Kinderen), WaterSavers and Thinking Power.

Children's books

Princess Laurentien is also the creator and writer of the Mr Finney series of children's books. Mr Finney and the World Turned Upside-down (2009) has been translated into English as well as Bulgarian, Catalan, Chinese, Papiamento, Portuguese, and Spanish. Two more Mr Finney books have been published in Dutch in 2011 and 2013. These books are parables that encourage children and adults to engage in a conversation on nature and the way we interact.

Florence Aubenas is a French journalist, who works for the newspaper Le Monde, after previously working for the newspaper Libération and the magazine Le Nouvel Observateur.

As International Reporter she covered important events in Rwanda, Kosovo, Algeria, Afghanistan, Irak, Syria and Lybia as well as many important trials.

She got to be known by the French public during the first Outreau trial in 2004. In this famous « judiciary shipwreck » she was one of the first to question the guiltiness of the numerous convicted.

She was taken hostage in Iraq on January 5, 2005 along with her translator Hussein Hanoun Al-Saadi. Both were freed on June 11, 2005. Her abduction transformed Ms Aubenas into a rallying figure for press freedom advocates in France and beyond. The Paris-based group Reporters Without Borders worked tirelessly towards her release. Her picture and that of Mr Saadi hung on walls in cities across Europe. French broadcasters regularly reminded viewers that the two remained in captivity.

From July 2009 until June 2012, she was President of the French Association International Observatory of Prisons to defend decent conditions of confinement and the respect of fundamental rights for detainees.

Under her actual name she conducted in 2009 a long inquiry in Caen, Normandy, about poor workers surviving with under minimum wage salary, just like the German Günter Wallraff in the 80's or Barbara Ehrenreich in the USA in the 2000's. After many temporary jobs, she worked as a cleaning lady on ferrys on Ouistreham's quays. The following book "Le Quai de Ouistreham" was a bestseller in France.

Plenary Session (20 August 2014, 08:30 - 09:15)

Plenary Speaker: Prof. Pierre Dillenbourg
Theme: Ten Surprises In Our MOOC Experience

EPFL produced its first MOOC two years before this conference. About 20 MOOCs have been conducted so far, some of them several times, and twice more are in the pipe. This led to vertiginous numbers, namely 500'000 registrations. These numbers are useful indicators that something is happening in higher education. It is however more interesting to report the many ways by which, in a less spectacular but deeper way, MOOCs tickle the academic landscape. I illustrate this tickling with a list of observations that somehow surprised us. They are articulated around the word "despite".

Despite the fact that our MOOCs are bachelor/master classes, about one third of the participants already have a bachelor and one third has a master. The usual distinction between undergraduate education and con-





tinuous education is blurred. Other participants would not be admitted as university students (teenagers, adults without formal training,..), but, despite their lack of pre-requisites, some of them succeed. Academia is partly loosing control. Many on-campus students take a MOOC despite being enrolled in an on-campus course on the same topic. Sometimes, they challenge their teacher about alternative explanations, methods or solutions they found in the MOOC. On-campus students take MOOCs outside their campus, in an uncontrolled way, despite the fact that they won't receive credits. In corporations, many employees follow MOOCs despite the fact that these MOOCs do not belong to the corporate training program. When a MOOC is repeated several times, successful participants from previous sessions volunteer to be so-called 'community assistants' for the next session: being a TA despite being unpaid is something new, at least on European campuses. Despite the fear that MOOCs will reduce the interest of students for printed books, some MOOCs led to very good sales of the related textbooks. Students seem to appreciate the possibility to access contents in very different formats. Despite the fact that a video does not replace a face-to-face relationship, many online students seem to develop a personal relationship with a teacher they never met. Despite the fact that academic culture does not treat teaching performance as equal to research performance in the promotion process, the visibility of MOOCs has brought teaching as a high stake element, close a highly cited paper. I kept for the end the most important point. Despite the salience of the video lectures, the main impact of MOOCs on on-campus students is that they have the time to digest the theory before attending to exercises sessions. Even if this were the only effect of MOOCs, it would nonetheless fully justify all the energy that we have invested because these exercise session constitute the actual learning phase.

A former teacher in elementary school, Pierre Dillenbourg graduated in educational science (University of Mons, Belgium). He started his research on learning technologies in 1984. He obtained a PhD in computer science from the University of Lancaster (UK), in the domain of artificial intelligence

applications for educational software. He has been professor assistant at TECFA, University of Geneva. He joined EPFL in November 2002. He has been the director of CRAFT, the pedagogical unit for 10 years and is now the academic director of the EPFL Center for Digital Education and head of the CHILI Lab: "Computer-Human Interaction for Learning & Instruction" and recently organized the first European congress about MOOCS.

These various observations do not yet constitute scientific findings; they are based on anecdotes in the worst cases and student surveys in the best cases. They still have to be confirmed by rigorous empirical studies.



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
