Project Objectives

- Provide the research community with an aligned, high-quality, and sustainable OA scholarly communication ecosystem, capable of implementing OA as a standard publication practice across the ERA.
- Common standards, guidelines, and best practices will be co-created and adopted as an Extensible Quality Standard for Institutional Publishing (EQSIP/DOAS).
- Create a community, supporting services, and non-technical infrastructure for Institutional Publishing Service Providers (IPSPs) that adopt common standards, guidelines, and best practices.





Diamond Open Access Standard (DOAS)

- Comprehensive quality
 framework based on essential and testable criteria across seven key components of scholarly publishing
- Equitable, transparent, and high-quality practices can be implemented using insights learned from DOAS
- Supports the growth of Diamond OA publishing





DOAS Deployment

Supported by a Self-assessment tool



- To self-evaluate scholarly publishers adherence to DOAS
- To identify strengths and weaknesses
- Providing graphic support and access to resources for improving compliance

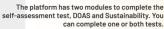



Common Access Point (CAP)

Registry: Publisher & Service Provider profiles with information on their operations

Self-assessment tools: workflow to evaluate compliance to standards & best practices

Training platform: scenario-based learning paths and materials

Portal: guided access to components & resources

Forum: virtual space to support interaction & knowledge exchange

Toolsuite: information & support on standards & best practices





The Common Access Point (CAP)

lays the foundation for the future **Diamond OA Publishing Capacity Hub**,

a virtual network of national and/or regional nodes supporting the research community towards the adoption of OA as a standard publication practice.

CRAFT-OA (Creating a Robust Accessible Federated Technology for Open Access)

- aims to make state-of-the-art Open Access publishing available to everyone
- running from January 2023 to December 2025 the project helps publishers by improving the technical and organisational infrastructure of *Diamond Open Access*
- Diamond Open Access is an equitable publishing model that does not charge fees to either readers or authors. Diamond OA publishing initiatives are *community-driven*, *academic-led* and *academic-owned*.



Provide — technical improvements for journal platforms & journal software



Foster — bibliodiversity by supporting local, regional & multicultural publishing initiatives



Increase — visibility,
discoverability and recognition
for Diamond Open Access
publishing



Integrate — Diamond Open
Access publishing with the

Key Exploitable Results (KERs)



5 Key Exploitable Results = main results of the project developed to support and enhance Diamond Open Access publishing and facilitate its sustainability and collaboration among all actors in the Diamond Open Access community

KER 1: Diamond Discovery Hub (DDH)

- A comprehensive registry of institutionally published and scholar-led Open Access Journals in Europe
- Scalable as well as easy to maintain and extendable in the future
- A service that provides Diamond journals' data curated by an editorial team.

KER 2: OJS core feature enhancements

- A collection of new features developed for the journal publishing platform Open Journal Systems that
 - o implements new solutions that allow editors to work with user and reviewer data in a GDPR-compliant way and
 - o addresses discovered shortcomings in the platform's support for multilingual content and metadata
- Contributing to an elevated standard of metadata quality
- New features will be incorporated into future releases of OJS and will be made available for Open Monograph Press (for publishing books) and Open Preprint Systems (for publishing preprints)

Key Exploitable Results (KERs)

KER 3: OpenAIRE Publisher Dashboard

- Provides publishers with a comprehensive dashboard to manage and promote their research products
- Empowers publishers to enhance their visibility and impact within the Open Science community
- Will provide seamless integration with the European Open Science Cloud (EOSC)

KER 4: Institutional Publishing Technical Living Handbook (LH)

- Will document and present results of the CRAFT-OA project in an ongoing and sustainable manner, thus providing **long-term** support for institutional publishing
- Complementary to DIAMAS handbook focuses on technical aspects of institutional publishing
- CRAFT-OA aims to connect with communities of practice

KER 5: OJS Diamond Plugins

- aims to address **interoperability between different publishing frameworks** to better aggregate metadata, align publishing with the EOSC Interoperability Framework on Research Product Publishing, and gather feedback from the EOSC catalogue
- Five OJS plugins are to be implemented:
 - 1. OJS connector for OpenAIRE Research Graph
 - 2. OJS plugin for the EOSC Interoperability Framework on Research Product Publishing
 - 3. OJS plugins for integrating feedback from the EOSC Catalogue
 - 4. OJS Visibility Pathfinder plugin and
 - 5. Plugins for OJS and Lodel Interoperability based on XML



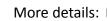






D2.2 Reusable curriculum for upskilling training

- Target groups: Open Access Journal editors, reviewers, Institutional Publishing Service Providers (IPSPs) and Institutional Publishing Technical Providers (IPTPs)
- D2.2 provides a modular framework for upskilling qualification in technical topics and takes into account the variety of publishing environments in which they occur
- In addition to suggesting the training topics, the deliverable elaborates on their contents, presents existing training materials and provides practical recommendations for organising and structuring a training
- Each training topic has a potential target audience, a user level and a FAIR principle assigned
- It includes a curriculum checklist, which can be used as a backbone of the upskilling agenda
- The curriculum is designed to be adapted to the context and to the mode of training







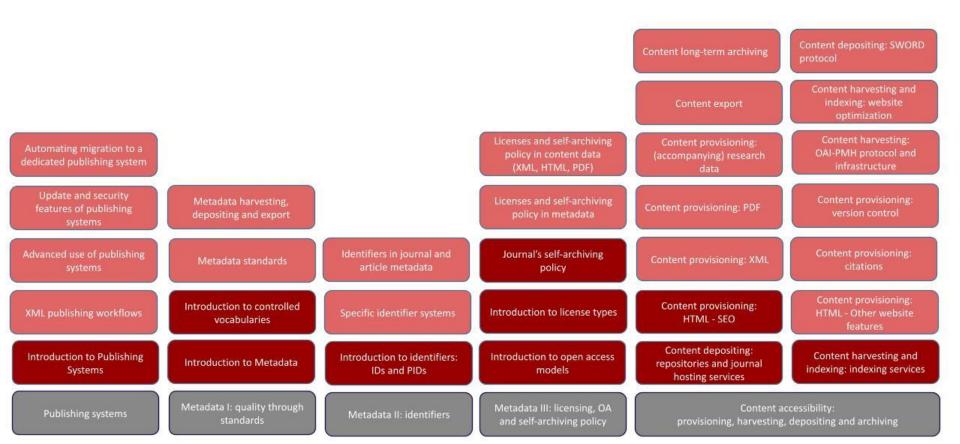




Block Topic Foundational Level

- Knowledge Base on the OA book funding and policy landscape as an extension of the OAPEN OA Books Toolkit (SO1)

- ★ Actionable and evidence-based recommendations + Funder Forum + Policy Development Tool concept (SO4)

OA Books - Conference Consultation

Draft Recommendations for Libraries - Give your Feedback!

- Promote and (further) develop an OA publication policy with other stakeholders
 in your institution to include OA books whilst aligning with funder and government
 policies. This policy should include information on versioning, rights retention, open
 licensing, metadata, support mechanisms such as infrastructure, funding and
 conditions and exceptions.
- Raise awareness of the importance of OA books and their benefits when
 providing clear and visible support for researchers and authors in your institution.
 This includes contact details for support staff, key benefits, training, resources and
 guidelines about options for OA book publishing, through choosing the Diamond OA
 model.
- Engage in long-term solutions for the preservation of OA books as part of your OA policy.
- Explore synergies between university libraries and university presses, infrastructures and other OA book partners.
- Specify what metadata is required to deposit books OA, e.g. the version, the
 time (immediate or embargo), PIDs or other information and to link publications
 with research data. Provide support to your authors to enable them to do this in
 your institutional repository.

OA Books - Conference Consultation

Draft Recommendations for Libraries - Give your Feedback!

- 6. Promote that authors retain sufficient rights to make a copy of their OA book or chapter and raise awareness of the importance of this. And decide together with your institution on the preferred open licence for your OA book or chapter, such as a Creative Commons licence.
- Develop internal strategies and funding processes to support the publication
 of OA books by your authors, including Diamond OA models and open
 infrastructures that support OA books, such as through collection development
 budgets, OA funds, or other, and specify limitations where relevant.
- Consider developing institutional incentives for making your author's books OA, for instance through choosing the Diamond OA model.
- Engage in long-term solutions for the preservation of OA books as part of your OA policy.
- Explore synergies between university libraries and university presses, infrastructures and other OA book partners.
