
### **After 1995**


## **Challenges**

- Various payment methods
- Administrative costs, bank charges
- Labor intensive, not cost-effective

# **Findings of Payment Methods from Global Surveys**

#### **IFLA Voucher Scheme**

- ❖ A game changer in 1995, simple and flexible
- Requires shipment between libraries
- Libraries' collections shifted from print to electronic resources
- Increasing trend of borrowing only non-returnables
- ❖ Need a new format, electronic version




- ❖ Formed after the ISO plenary meeting in May 2023 to look at the landscape of ILL financial transactions
- Looking to address a variety of pain-points
  - > Ecosystems lacked some level of interoperability when it comes to the cost of resource sharing
  - > Lots of manual processing for resource sharing teams (invoices, credit cards, mailing vouchers, etc.)
- ❖ The Place to start: an environmental scan
- ❖ The ISO survey was deployed globally last summer; last fall, our group worked to evaluate and process the results of the survey
- After the survey, we spent some time looking over the results with two key stakeholder groups
  - ➤ Centre for Interlibrary Loan Transactions maintenance agency for ISO 18626, the international standard for interoperability between resource sharing systems
  - > IFLA Document Delivery and Resource Sharing Section
- The goals of our recommendations: bring down silos, reduce costs, faster transaction times





Survey response by organization type







- International representation
  - > 57% of responses were from outside the United States
  - > Africa, Asia, Europe, and North America were clearly represented in the results; South America was less well represented
- National library perspectives
  - > We knew going into the survey that some national libraries already fulfill the role as a central payment mediator
  - > Through the survey, we found a pretty even split between national libraries that are currently doing this or interested in doing it vs. the national libraries that might not feel positioned to offer such a service
- Consortial perspectives
  - > While our group's initial thoughts were that national libraries might embrace the role more, we initially thought consortia might feel like they were not in a position to offer such a service
  - > The results of the survey proved us wrong...we found a stronger response from consortia





- Individual libraries
  - ➤ Many individual libraries responded to the survey
  - > The overwhelming majority emphasized their first preference in terms of payment was the vendor-neutral approach that IFLA vouchers offered followed by electronic payment mechanisms





## **Recommendations for Future Development**

- ❖ ISO TC 46/SC 4/AHG 1
  - ➤ AHG 1 recommended the the reactivation of WG 14 to prepare a revision of ISO 18626 incorporating the recommendations outlined in the 2025 CILLT Liaison Report to ISO TC 46/SC 4 (CILLT's recommendations validated AHG 1's recommendation to implement some payment functionality to the standard)
  - ➤ Leadership for WG 14 was recommended as follows
    - Mark Paris from AHG 1 to be convenor
    - Allen Jones from CILLT to be the project leader
    - Myounghyun Shim from ISO TC 46/SC 4 to provide convenor support because of her expertise of all things ISO
  - ➤ CILLT and AHG 1 both recommend that IFLA consider joining ISO TC 46/SC 4 as a category A liaison to facilitate an ongoing dialog between ISO and IFLA regarding standards development and implementation
  - ➤ Consider to develop a electronic version of IFLA Voucher
